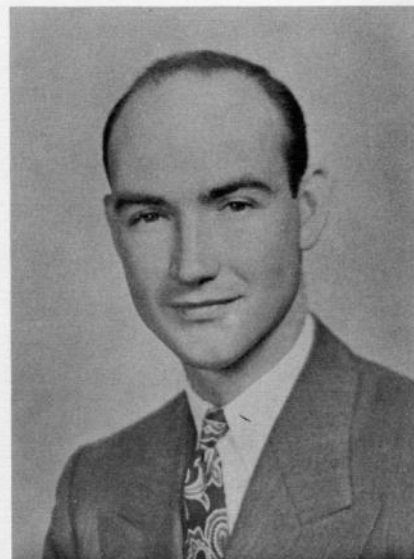

Student Council

(Because of the close co-operation between the faculty and the student council, the council has been included as part of the administration).

STUDENT COUNCIL

The student council started its second year of existence by changing the method of election of council members. Members were chosen from the nine home rooms and the two junior high grades rather than by classes. All members had to have passing grades in order to be eligible and must keep up these grades in order to remain a member.

The officers of the council were chosen from the members and are as follows: David Penwell, President; Peggy Day, Vice-President; Dick Marsh, Treasurer; and Carol Hess, Secretary. The other members of the council are Bob Means, Linda Moore, John Williams, John Minge, Ted Bauer, Margaret Wagaman, Ray Hensel, Marjorie Wallace, Joan Fast, and Everett Larson.

The council acts in an advisory capacity on student affairs. Suggestion boxes were placed in the home rooms so students might introduce any suggestions they had for school improvement. These suggestions were then collected by the council president and brought before the council which met each week. The council accomplished these things during the year; presented a program which allowed students to drive at noon, made recreation rooms available for boys and girls during the noon hour, helped to improve the eating conditions in the school gym, furthered development of safety rules on the school premises, and helped to promote co-operation between the students and the administration. Through a student council, the student body may feel that they have a part in the development of their school.

The council advisor was Mr. Anderson.

Miss Mary Olson was our teacher in third grade and Miss Florence Phillips was our music teacher. Claude Stevenson and Mary Jane Waage entered our class during the year. Our most interesting project was the making of clay pottery vases. Pupils from the other rooms were invited to see them.

The fourth year of school started with Miss Lois Dotson as our teacher. We were all thrilled over the fact that we were now on the second floor of the school and one of the upper grades. Our room was like a small village and the name of it was Littletown. The corner of Littletown that served as the jail proved to be the most used corner of the room. Our principal was Miss Vivian Stinson and our music teacher was Miss Crawford.

During the fifth grade, we gained many new members. They were Eddie Joe Roberts, Edna Burns, Earl Gage, Roger Gray, and Billie Marie Gardner. We had a beautiful May Festival with Miss Christianson as our Sponsor. The King and Queen were selected from the sixth grade and Mary Jane Waage and Richard Veak were attendants from our room.

The sixth grade was our year of glory for we were the "big wheels" of the Lincoln Building. Miss Flossie Miller was our teacher and new classmates were: LaVerna Bosteder, Jeanine Hays, Russell Loghry, and Ray Hensel. We had another May Festival with Dorothy Wright as Queen and Roger McCreedy as King. Earl Gage and Corliss Graham were our attendants.

Next year we moved to the Junior High Department of the High School building. This year we had two teachers, Miss Margaret Miller and Miss Belle Stone. We had our first football and track team this year. New students this year were Claude Stevenson, Nancy Henson, Wayne Lewis, Mary Jane Waage, while Richard Veak, Betty Fisher, and Marcia Lee moved away. Mrs. Loretta Brooks from Sioux City was our Music teacher.

We entered the eighth grade with the same teachers, Miss Miller and Miss Stone. New-comers were Betty Rhamy, Phyllis Scott, Leo Lowenberg, Joyce Stahnke, and Verlea Gay. Mrs. William Anderson was our new music teacher and Mrs. Keith Whitmore took charge of our physical training. For the first time our class elected officers. They were: Nancy Henson, President; Eddie Joe Roberts, Vice-President; Duane Patterson, Secretary; and Earl Gage, Treasurer.

In the first game of the season the Blue Jays were defeated by a determined Bedford eleven. The final score was Bedford 26, Villisca 0.

Villisca, making a quick start and taking advantage of their opponents mistakes resulted in a victory for the Jays in their third game. The game proved to be a grueling battle to finish. The Jay eleven proved the stronger in the end and the game ended, Villisca 19, Lenox 7.

A powerful Atlantic team rolled over the inexperienced Jays 38-0.

In a raging downpour the 1950 Jays played one of their most memorable games. They lost the game to a muchly favored Creston team 12-0 but displayed great ability to hold their opponents. At the homecoming game the Red Oak Tigers defeated and outclassed the Blue Jay eleven. The score at the final gun was, Red Oak 49, Villisca 18.

Corning, led by Drexel Lundquist rolled over the Jays in the next game by a score 63 to 24. In this game Lundquist broke the record set by Gourley by racking up 50 points.

In the last game of the season the Jays and Clarinda Cardinals fought to a 7-7 tie in bitter cold weather. So ended the 1950 football season with a record of two wins, six losses and one tie.
