Dear parents of VHS students,

In the early nineteenth century our ancestors initiated a system of education for this country that enabled all children to attend school on an equal basis. The idea was radically new, and to this day, has no equal among the nations of the world. At present, thirteen years of free education are provided. Yes. Free to the children, but not to the adults. The cost of education for all is substantial and we sometimes complain that it is a terrible expense. Is it strictly an expense? Let us consider the position that the people of this country enjoy: in world leadership, in the highest standard of living, in an opportunity to succeed, in the comforts of life, and in the leisure time to enjoy these comforts - to name only a few.

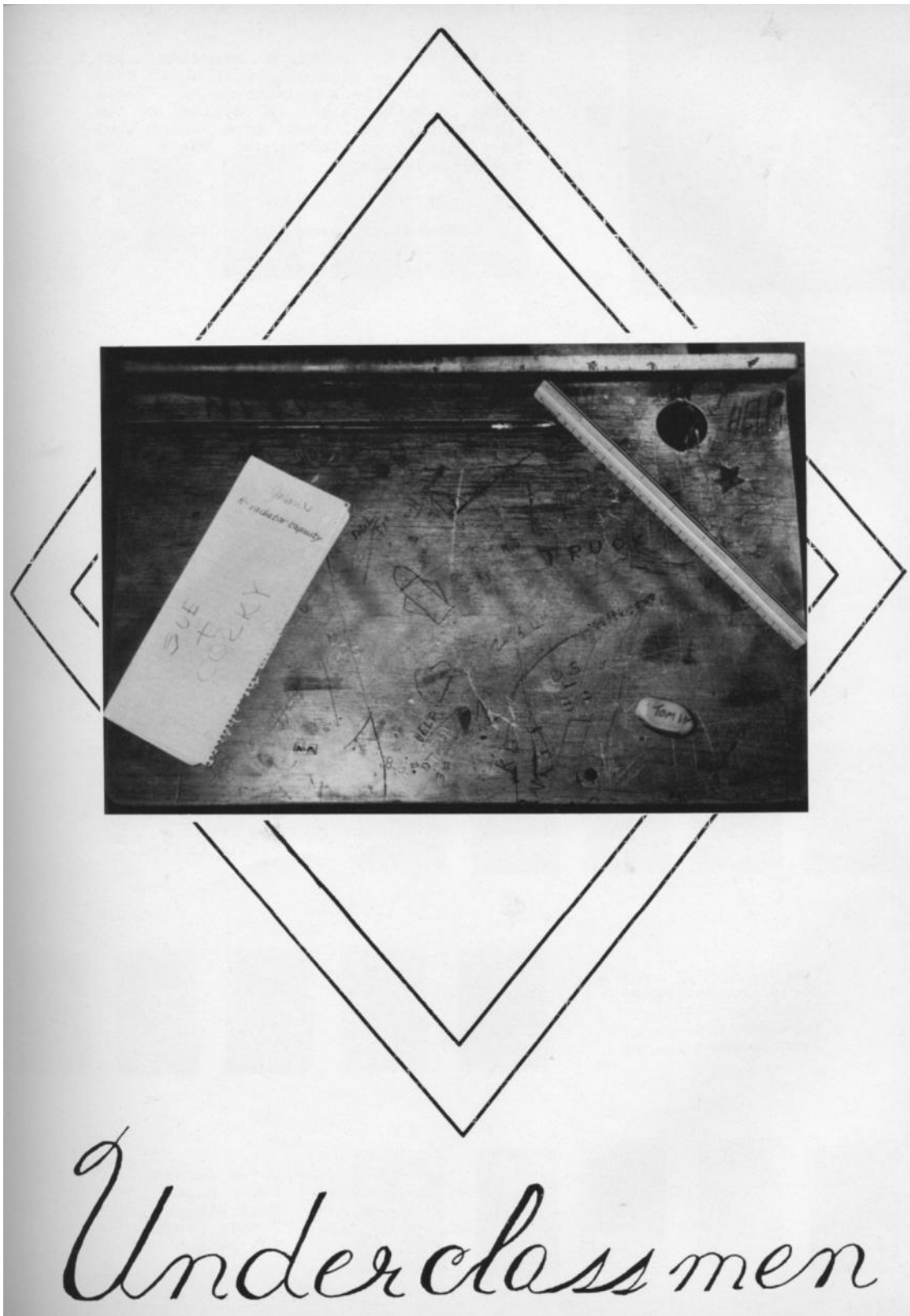
## *Blue Hawaii*

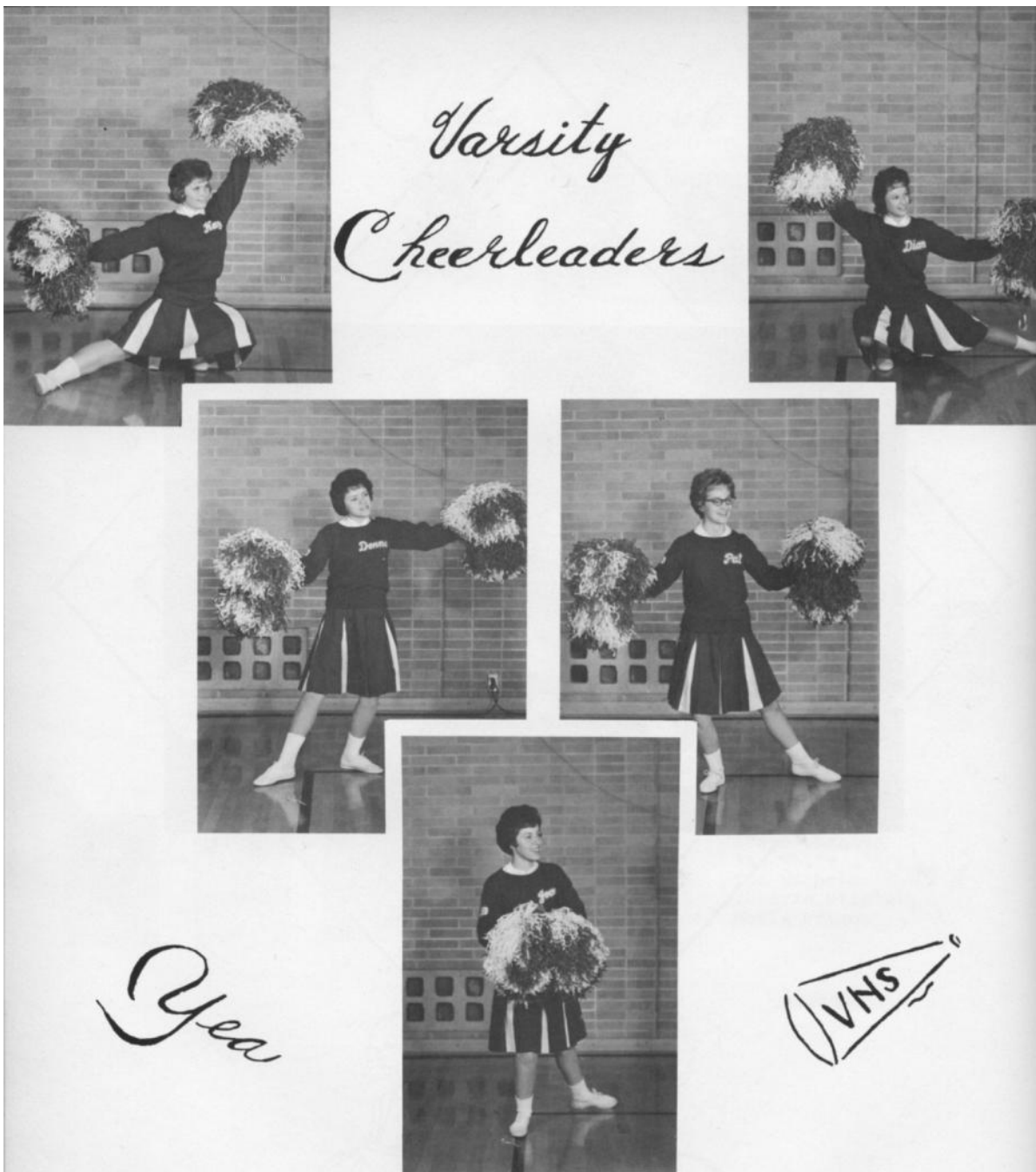

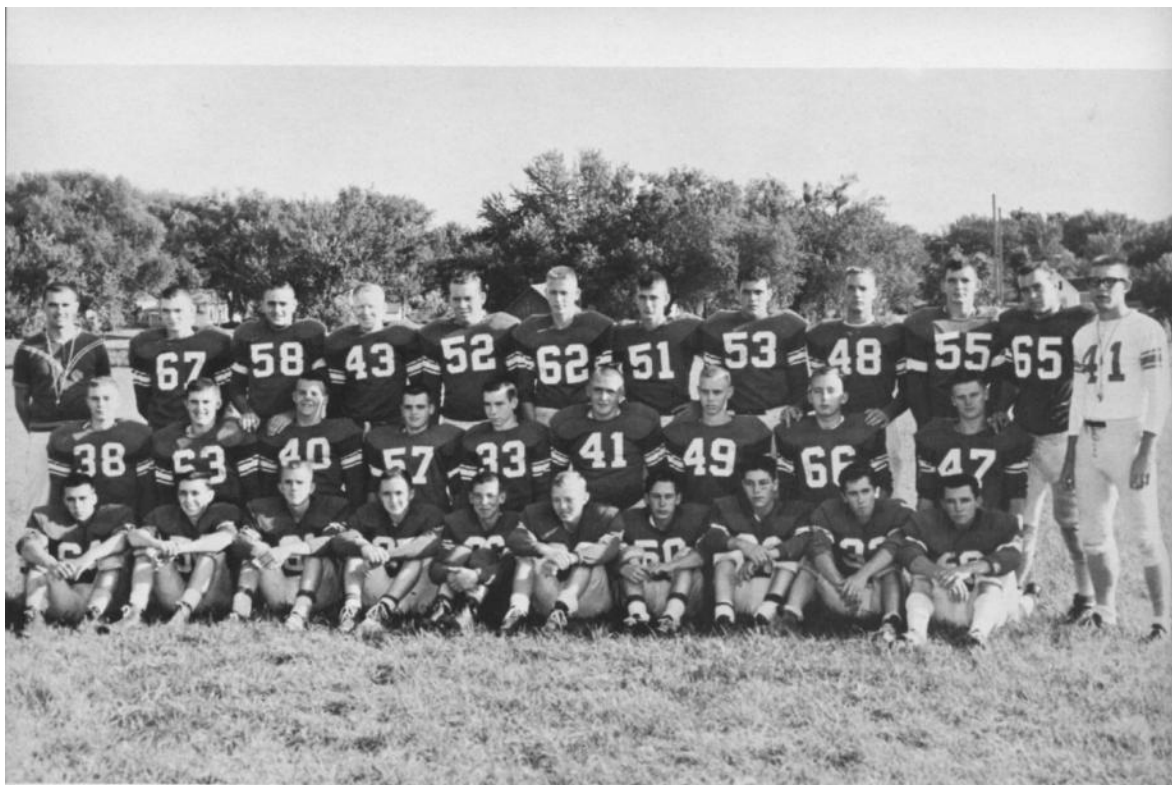

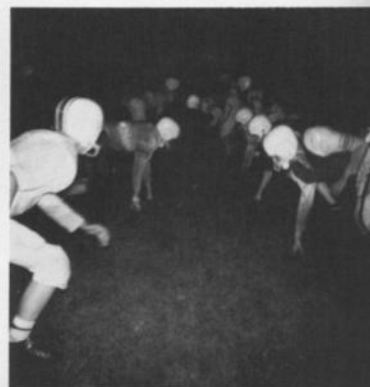

## Intramurals

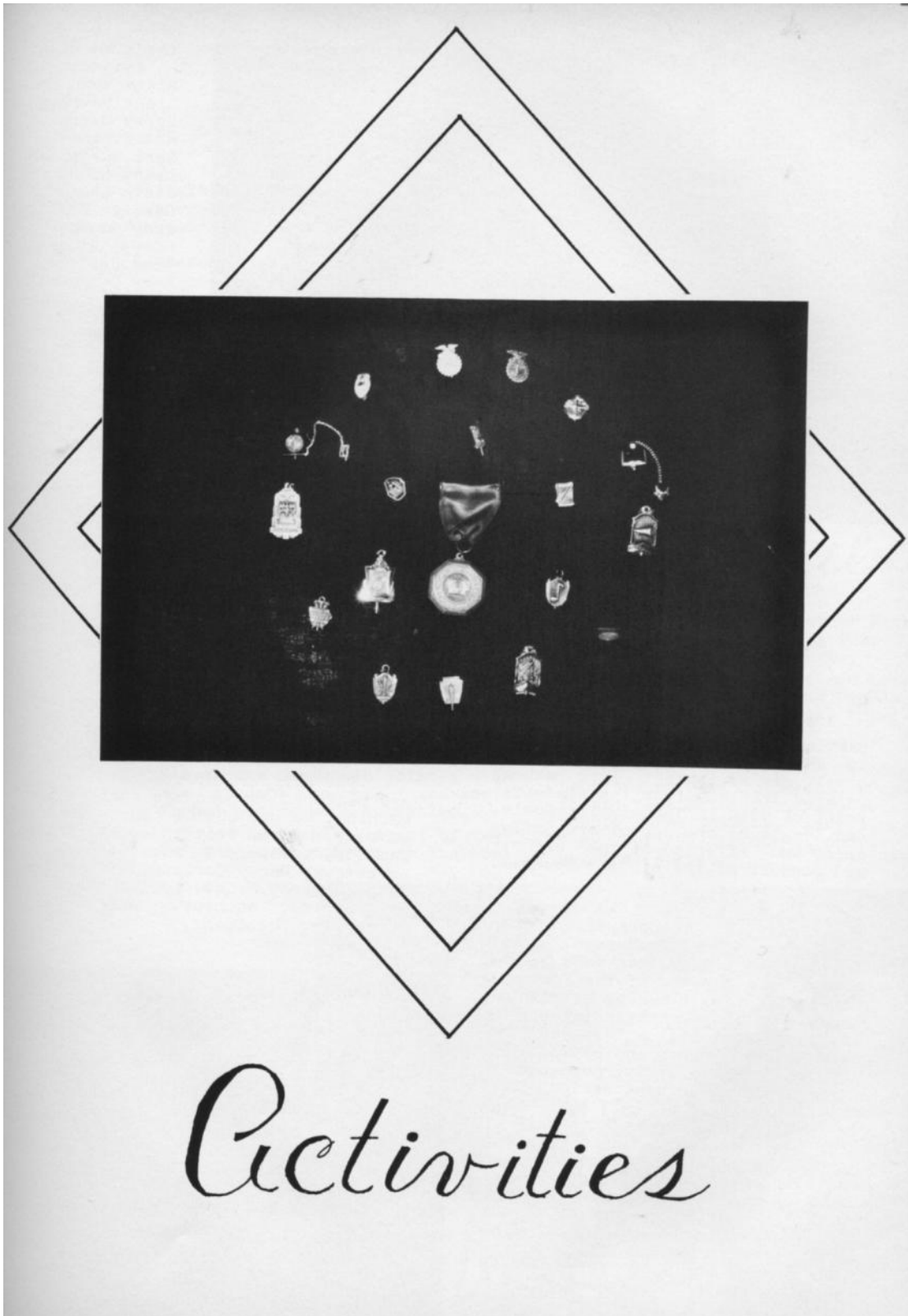

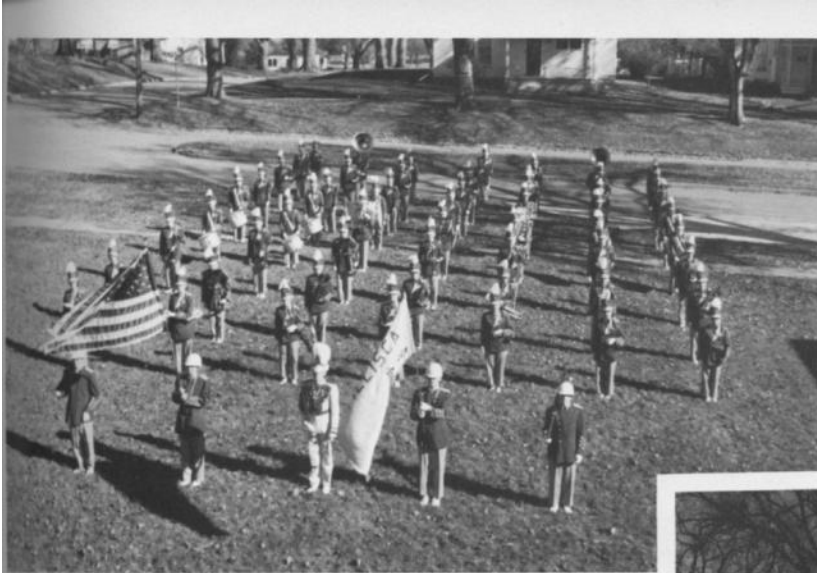

# 50 Years of Growth



All Villisca children begin their education at the Lincoln Building, constructed in 1902. Originally, it held grades 1-8, but today kindergarten, first and second grade attend there.

Villisca first reorganized their school district in 1957. July 1, 1959, the district was enlarged with the consolidation of Villisca and Nodaway. Grades 5-8 now attend school at the Nodaway schoolhouse.



1963 marks the 50th year since the founding of Villisca High School in 1913. Soon the crowded conditions deemed it necessary to expand the building. Consequently, the northwest wing was added in 1926.

Increased enrollment created the need for additional classrooms. In 1960, the Sylvia Enarson building, which houses grades 3-4, was built. A new gymnasium and shop were added as a southwest wing of the high school at the same time.





Improvements in the town included a new post office, a veterinary clinic on Highway 71, an addition to the Methodist Church, and the resurfacing of the road from Villisca to Nodaway.

This group of instruments consists of an Oscilloscope (measures wave forms) an Audio-frequency Generator (generates electrical impulse of 20-20,000 cycles per second) and an Electronic Switch used to compare frequencies on the Oscilloscope.

# A Look at Our Nation

SEATTLE, WASHINGTON hosted the WORLD'S FAIR. Included in the top attractions were the Space Needle, the Monorail, and the revolving restaurant of exotic dishes.

CALIFORNIA surpassed NEW YORK in population.

Three Kennedy brothers hold government positions: John F. Kennedy is President of the United States, Robert Kennedy is the Attorney-General and Ted Kennedy is a senator.

The NATIONAL DEBT reached 300 billion dollars.



1113 CUBAN REFUGEES were released in return for 53 million dollars worth of drugs and medicine sent by the U.S.

RUSSIA built up a strong store of arms in CUBA.

The UNITED NATIONS settled the trouble in the CONGO concerning the succession of KATANGA province.

There are now 112 members in the UNITED NATIONS.

The BERLIN WALL to stop exodus of East Germans to the West was built August 12-13, 1961. It was 27 miles long. Peter Fechter was the 50th person killed trying to scale the wall to freedom.

Pacifist INDIA was jarred by a Red Chinese attack on their border.

A rift developed between RED CHINA and RUSSIA over party doctrines.

TELSTAR, U.S. satellite, relayed television programs to and from Europe. Telephone conversations were also sent via Telstar. Made by AMERICAN TELEPHONE and TELEGRAPH, it was the first privately owned earth satellite.

Conservative leader DIEFENBAKER of Canada toppled because of an issue over United States nuclear arms in Canada.

LASER, an optical measurer of light, came into being. In the future it will be used to track satellites, as a defense weapon, and in "knifeless surgery."

COLOR POLAROID FILM went on the market for the first time.

ALGERIA gained independence from FRANCE after seven years of fighting.



BILLIE SOL ESTES was convicted on counts of fraud, conspiracy and interstate transportation of fraudulent mortgages, mortgages on non-existent anhydrous ammonia storage tanks and irregular cotton acreage allotments.

GEORGE ROMNEY (former president of American Motors) and NELSON ROCKEFELLER were both successful in their bids for the governorships of Michigan and New York respectively. These men at present are slated as possible presidential candidates in 1964.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY stressed PHYSICAL FITNESS for U.S. citizens. The Marines were asked to take a 50-mile hike (a rule left over from the time of Theodore Roosevelt) to prove their fitness. Soon 50-mile hikes were a national craze.

The "MARINER," a Venus satellite sent back valuable information about the planet and its atmosphere.

FRANCE led by Charles DeGaulle rejected Britain in their bid for a seat in the European Economic Community.

PROJECT MERCURY put three U.S. astronauts into space. February 20, COLONEL JOHN H. GLENN, JR. completed a three orbit flight in the "Friendship 7." NAVY LIEUTENANT SCOTT CARPENTER also orbited the earth three times. His flight took place May 24 in the "Aurora 7" October 3 NAVY COMMANDER WALTER SCHIRRA circled the earth in the "Sigma 7" for a flight of six orbits. It was said that before the end of this year, our astronauts will stay up for flights of 36 hours in duration.

ADOLF EICHMANN was tried in Israel for his mass extermination of the Jews during World War II. He was executed May 31, 1962.

The 20th VATICAN COUNCIL in 20 centuries met in the Vatican City to discuss reforms in the Catholic Church. These were to affect the life, worship, and discipline of the Catholics, and the way the church looks to other Christians.

RICHARD NIXON was defeated in his bid for the California governorship by PAT BROWN. Many speculate the end of his political career.

U.S. experts in guerrilla warfare went to VIETNAM to instruct Vietnamese soldiers. The country is fighting Communist infiltration.

Democrat HAROLD HUGHES was elected to the Iowa governorship. He was the only Democratic official elected.

# The Days Gone By

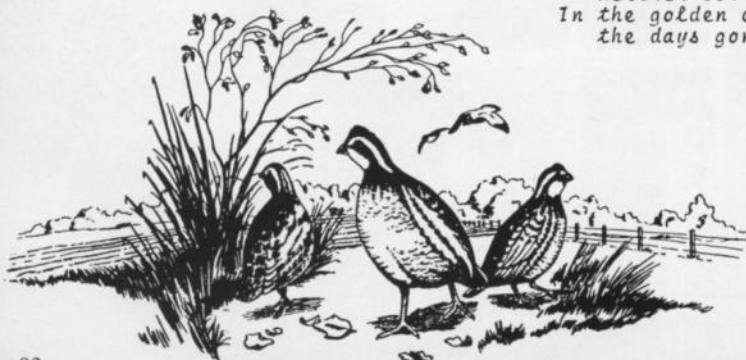
O the days gone by! O the days

the days gone by.

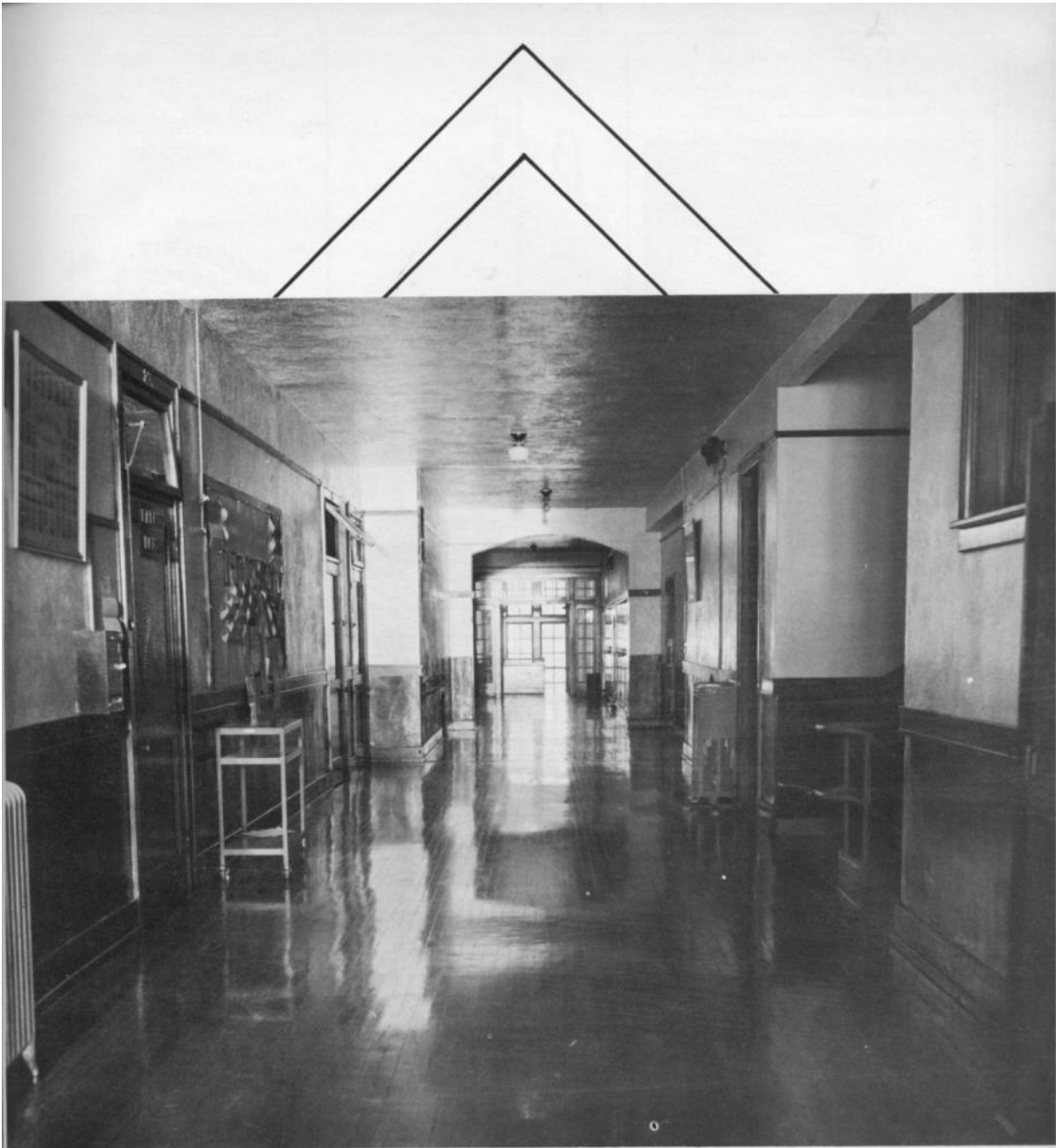


In the days gone by, when my naked
